Dear Secretary of State,

I am writing to resign my position as independent scientific adviser on the Misuse of Drugs.

When you met the ACMD in November 2009, many of us expressed our concern over the way you and your predecessor, Chairman, Professor David Nutt, Professor Nutt's content of a lecture he gave in his own role and what the ACMD had given on the appropriate classification of substances had rejected. I, and other members, Dr Les Iverson and Dr [redacted] present.

At that meeting, you were unable to give the necessary assurances and your scientific advice would be restricted in future and three further members, Dr [redacted] Marshall and Dr Ian Kagan resigned. Others of us of the Association of the Government's response to the principles for the appointment of scientific advisers had been drawn up by the scientific community and endorsed by several ACMD members.

The Government's first response, published in December, was rightly appeared to justify ministers appointing and dismissing independent scientific advisers according to trust which is an arbitrary and subjective matter. A requirement for advisers to comply with the Code of Practice for Advisory Committees, and not to make any statement of opinion or advice and its communication. Several of us, including [redacted] and [redacted] etc and advisers felt that the ACMD's recommendation to the Government's [redacted] points were made by the Science and Technology Select Committee in Government.

I am therefore disappointed that the Government has insisted, since the publication of this week of a [redacted] requirement for advisers to comply with the Code of Practice, irrespective of whether the code of practice has been complied with.
